

Manager's Message

Spring construction season nears for Ceylon fiber

Spring is just around the corner; our construction season will once again be in full swing. As we ended the 2022 construction season, our fiber-to-the-home project was halted in Ceylon; they plan to resume as soon as they can. April would be great, if the weather cooperates. They plan to be completed before summer hits. They have about half of the

town installed with fiber and will mobilize to finish it. They will take a short break in the part of town for Ceylon Days. So far we have 135 residents signed up for taking the gigabit-speed fiber to the home; we will be separately working with businesses, as this is not part of the grant. The fiber line goes north out of town to Highway 22 and to the west of that a bit. About a dozen or so farms will have access to fiber as it goes by — we will be reaching out to them regarding their interest. Again, the service we will provide is a symmetrical service up to 1 gig down and 1 gig up. We anticipate the majority of you will take the 100-mbps download and the 100-mbps upload. The system is scalable up to a 10 gigabit symmetrical service, which will cover many hi-tech business needs. We hope to have this entire project lit up and completed by the end of June. If you are in any of these areas and haven't talked to us, please call. We will be reaching out to you before too long.

Fiber grant updates for rural Martin and Jackson Counties

We have also been working hard on a couple grant opportunities for the rest of the Federated REA footprint, including that area in Martin County that is served by South Central REA. We will, however, be staying clear of areas that are already served by a local ISP that can provide you with at least 100-mbps download and 20-mbps upload. These areas are off limits for grants and are considered served. We are most concerned with the unserved and underserved areas.

ReConnect 4 is a grant from USDA and our preferred funded service area covers all of the unserved and underserved areas of Martin County. We are anxiously awaiting word on it, which, if successful, will bring fiber to the home or business to about 2,500 locations. We should be hearing sometime in the second quarter of 2023.

Border to Border is another one that we are applying for. That application was due March 2 and was broken into two application. One for the city of Northrup serving about 116 locations and the other is in Jackson County serving about 480 locations. Again, we needed to avoid areas where service is already available, as well as those areas that were awarded to AMG/Next link for a fixed wireless build-out in selected areas.

Speaking of fixed wireless, our own Federated wireless system is growing. We are adding towers all the time and identifying members that we can see from the towers. Our goal is to get all of our members on our fixed wireless system as an interim step to fiber to the home when it comes.

Federated welcomes 100 City of Dunnell electric accounts February 22

I will close with a project that's been in the planning stage since 2021 — bringing the city of Dunnell customers into the Federated family as members. The Minnesota Public Service Commission recently approved the action; as of February 22, the residents are now served directly by our system. We welcome the 104 accounts and look forward to providing them the same great service Federated has provided since its inception in 1935.

We want you to know that all of us at Federated, whether for electricity or broadband, are committed to providing you with products that exceed your expectations, while keeping service safe, reliable, affordable and providing great member service. This is the beauty of the cooperative business model — every member has a voice either individually or through your elected representatives.



Directors approve 3 percent rate increase starting with April 1 use due to increasing operating costs

One of the benefits of being a cooperative member-owner is that Federated provides cost-conscience rates, along with safe and reliable power. You vote to elect local directors to represent your interests.

The last few years with Covid shutdowns, supply chain shortages and inflation all indicated that Federated needed to increase its electric rates this spring due to a budgeted shortfall. The Federated Board of Directors approved the three percent rate increase at their February 28 meeting. This rate adjustment will go into effect April 1, which would appear on the May bills. The increase occurs with the monthly service charge for each rate class and also changed the demand charges. See the chart for details.

The service charge is the fixed monthly charge, which represents a portion of the cost to operate, even if no energy is sold. This covers a portion of the expenses related to lines, meters, substations, buildings, employees and trucks. The last Cost of Service Study indicated the residential (Rate Class A) service charge should be at \$38 a month to recover the costs. Federated, even with this rate change to \$25 a month, features a lower monthly service charge that is very competitive, industry wide.

The demand is the highest 15 minutes of usage during the billing period. The co-op must build its electrical infrastructure to ensure that it is large enough to accommodate the highest demand, which is measured in kilowatt-hours (kW).

"Our directive from your Board of Directors requires us to mitigate annual increases," said Scott Reimer, Federated's general manager. "However, if they do become necessary, we will make small adjustments to avoid rate shock. Rates are analyzed annually and the financial forecast is used to determine the need."

The rapid changes in our industry have affected the cooperative from

everything from fuel, poles, meters, transformers and wholesale power costs. While the rate increase is three percent, the cost of underground cable has increased 50 percent; transformers increased about 70 percent, while other miscellaneous components increased 50 percent. Bucket and digger trucks have to be ordered two years in advance and have a price acceleration clause, as do all metals.

Federated's power cost adjustment (PCA) will continue to pass along to members the fluctuating costs of wholesale power from the cooperative's four suppliers.

The U.S. annual inflation rate has been 6.4 percent since 2022 so Federated's goal was to keep the rate increase as low as possible, but still be financially responsible, Reimer added.

Federated is aware of the pressure on materials and equipment costs and is taking action to curtail spending. For example, the \$13.4 million work plan outlining construction and maintenance may be stretched from four years to six years to make it more affordable yearly. A recent trencher purchase was leased, instead of purchasing it outright. Federated is also applying this year for \$4 million of federal grants through its national organization to upgrade the cooperative's distribution lines and substations, which include installing fiber optic communications to make Federated's grid smarter.

Keep in mind that the addition of Federated Broadband is NOT the reason for the rate increase. The electric and broadband income/expenses are separate so no subsidy exists.

Members can also become more energy-efficient to manage their energy costs. Replace an old inefficient furnace with an air source heat pump, taking advantage of the co-op's rebates and federal tax incentives, if eligible. Install a smart thermostat with WI-FI connectivity to adjust the home's temperature levels. Federated offers a \$25 Smart Thermostat rebate. Participate in the cooperative's energy-saving water heater program too where the water heater is turned off during peak times when electricity costs more. The larger tank and insulation helps members not even realize it's being controlled.

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Grassroots efforts helped modify energy bill

At Minnesota's electric cooperatives, our priority is to provide sustainable, reliable and affordable electricity. With that goal in mind, I want to provide an update on a piece of significant legislation that the governor recently signed.

That legislation calls for Minnesota's electric sector to be 100-percent carbon free by 2040. While Minnesota's rural electric

cooperatives had significant reservations with the original bill, we are pleased to report that the final package is better than what was first proposed, despite our continued concerns about affordability and reliability.

Our grassroots' efforts were successful in getting legislators from both sides of the aisle to work with us to add amendments that addressed some of our major concerns. Thank you to everyone who reached out to your legislators and made your voice heard. It made a difference.

Minnesota's electric cooperatives have long been working and planning toward a sustainable, reliable and affordable energy future. We want you, our member-owners, to know that the heat will be on in the dead of winter and the AC available in the dog days of summer. Furthermore, we want the electricity we provide to always be affordable for your family, while being good stewards of our planet.

The Minnesota Rural Electric Association successfully secured changes to the legislation that will provide more flexibility in implementing its mandates. As one example, we sought and obtained language providing greater flexibility in the use of renewable energy credits (RECs) as an option to comply with the carbon reduction mandates. We also received a reduction in the steep timeline, allowing co-ops to reach 60 percent carbon-free generation by 2030, rather than 80 percent at that time. All utilities still need to be 100-percent carbon free by 2040. However, the

legislation contains "off-ramps" that allow utilities to ask the Public Utilities Commission to modify the legislation's requirements if needed to protect reliability or affordability.

Minnesota's rural electric co-ops advocated for other adjustments to improve reliability and affordability that did not make it into the final bill; yet, we remain hopeful that additional concerns can be addressed in the future.

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Federated directors met with Minnesota Representatives Bjorn Olson and Marj Fogelman February 21. Directors in the back row are Darvin Voss, David Meschke, David A. Hansen, Bruce Brockmann and Scott Thiesse. Topics of discussion included the 100-percent carbon free mandate, opposing mandates on electric cooperatives and defending the rural electrification tax exemption.



Brown County REA directors also met with their legislators February 21. Director Brad Sprenger, Comfrey, discussed proposed legislation with Representative Paul Torkelson. Topics covered included the radio control receivers avoiding unnecessary state requirements and matching state funds to unlock federal infrastructure funding.
